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The preservation of Native American agriculture is important not only to Native American tribes, but to the history and overall literacy about agriculture in Oklahoma.

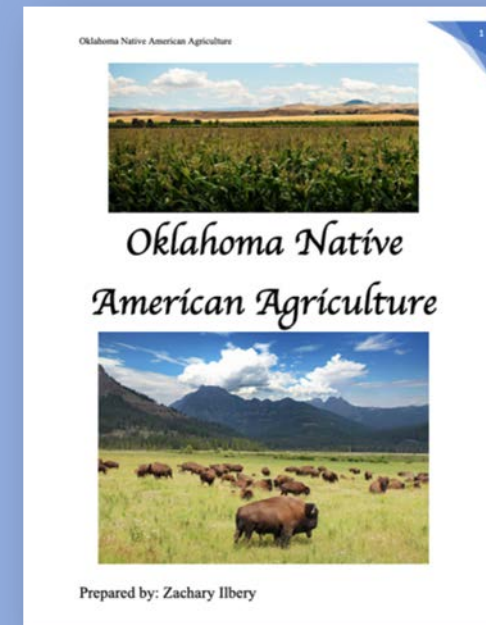
